Tony Sciascia has also agreed to do fish painting demonstrations during the show. Keep in mind that there is an artisan's sales booth. 2024 IDAHO ARTISTRY IN WOOD SHOW

The Idaho Artistry in Wood 2024 Wood and Gourd Art Show will be held in the fifth floor exhibition hall at JUMP (Jack's Urban Meeting Place) on Saturday, April 6 and Sunday, April 7. JUMP is located at 1000 W. Myrtle St., Boise ID 83702. Show hours on Saturday are 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. and on Sunday, 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. The show provides an opportunity for artists working in wood and gourds to participate in a judged competition and display their creations to the public.

Five wood-working clubs (Treasure Valley Scrollers, Southwest Idaho Woodturners Association, Idaho Gourd Society, Idaho Woodcarvers Guild and Ada County Woodworkers) collaborate to make this one-of-a-kind show a major Northwest cultural attraction. The show will include woodcarving, woodturning, fine woodworking, pyrography, intarsia, gourds, marquetry, scrolling and other wood art. No affiliation with a club is required to participate.

Since moving to Boise's premier downtown exhibition hall, the show has gained increased attention, attracting over 400 entries from a multi-state area. Media, government and business support have contributed to the success of the show. Idaho's Treasure Valley is home to many notable artists who use wood and gourds as their medium. Several have won prizes in national and international competition. Aspiring artists will have the opportunity to meet and draw inspiration from these experts and have their work evaluated by professional judges.

Tools and materials used in creating wood and gourd art will be available for sale. In addition to the juried competition, there will be vendors, raffles, a silent auction, demonstrations and artwork sales. The Saturday night banquet and auction is a great place to relax and enjoy the company of other wood and gourd artists. It is not necessary to participate in the banquet to bid on auction items

IWG Scholarship Program

Thanks largely to the proceeds from past Idaho Woodcarvers Guild and Idaho Artistry in Wood shows, the Guild has some surplus funds available that should be used in keeping with our status as a non-profit educational organization. With this in mind, the Board proposed and the club membership approved in January 2017 a scholarship program that allows club members to apply for partial reimbursement of money spent on a class, seminar or workshop that helps them improve their carving, painting or other artistic skills used in producing wood carvings. Members who are up to date with their club dues may apply once each year for a scholarship to reimburse them for up to ½ the cost of the course they have taken. The amount approved cannot exceed the dues paid by the member since joining the Guild. Those who receive this support should plan to share what they learned with others as occasion permits and bring works produced to show at a club meeting. Applications will be reviewed by the Executive Committee, for approval. Scholarship applications may be submitted at any time during the calendar year. The Board may limit scholarship funding each year to maintain sufficient reserves to keep the club in a healthy financial position.
